To Whom It May Concern,

We, the undersigned, confirm that the information included in this summary report and Observer Log are true, accurate, and correct.

That is, on 11 August 2025 at 7:51 am, Noam Yaron swam from Corsica, France to the nearshore waters of Monaco across the Mediterranean Sea. He was involuntarily pulled from the water at 2:15pm on 15 August 2025 within 2 km of the shore of Monaco. In total, Yaron swam for 102 hours 24 minutes (over the course of 4 days 6 hours 24 minutes), completing a total swimming distance of 191,17 km.

We were all present on two different escort boats in close proximity to Yaron throughout his swim from start to finish and personally witnessed his achievement. On occasion, we each slept for short periods over these 5 days and 4 nights; however, there were always several of us awake and watching Yaron.

The hourly Observer Log was created by Caroline Caillet with the assistance of Charlotte Figuera, Bernard Gianola, and Marine Dufour on the escort boats. Verification was confirmed remotely by Chris Morgan and Steven Munatones of the World Open Water Swimming Federation. The link to the detailed Observer Log is [here](#).

We witnessed and documented via written notes, photographs, and videos that Yaron continued his swim without assistance or artificial propulsion until he was pulled from the water on orders of the doctors and the team due to serious concerns for his health.

We confirm that Yaron never got out of the water for any reason, he never touched his two escort boats, he was never touched by any support crew members, and he was never pulled forward in any way by a rope or other assistance.

## **Record Categories**

Noam Yaron's swim of 191.17 km and 102 hours 24 minutes in the Mediterranean Sea in a Wetsuit between Calvi and the near-shore waters of Monaco (with no assistance of a strong current) accomplished on 11–15 August 2025. Ratified by the World Open Water Swimming Federation (WOWSF).

**According to our research, here are the potential records Noam Yaron's swim can claim:**

### **1. The World's Longest Ocean Swim by Distance in a Wetsuit: 191.17 km**

No prior record existed in this category in either the Guinness World Records database or the WOWSA database. The most comparable documented performances are:

- 510.56 km by Ross Edgley (United Kingdom), swum from Lower Laberge to the Stewart River confluence in the Yukon River, Canada, on 16–18 June 2024, in a wetsuit — recognized by Guinness World Records as the Longest Distance Assisted Adventure Swim. This performance took place in a strong current-assisted river, not in open ocean, and therefore does not constitute a record in this category.
- 250 km by Pablo Fernández Álvarez (Spain), swum in the Atlantic Ocean off Fort Lauderdale, Florida, USA, on 19–20 July 2021. Completed with the strong assistance of the Gulf Stream current in a swimsuit, not a wetsuit, and therefore does not constitute a record in this category. Pablo's record was recognized by Guinness World Records as the Longest Distance Ocean Swim (marathon swimming).
- 142.3 km by Neil Agius (Malta), swum around the Maltese Islands (Mellieha Bay to Ghar Lapsi) in the Mediterranean Sea, on 21–23 September 2024 — ratified by the World Open Water Swimming Association (WOWSA). Completed in a swimsuit, not a wetsuit, and therefore does not constitute a record in this category.

Noam Yaron's 191.17 km in the Mediterranean Sea establishes a world record in the open ocean with a wetsuit, with no assistance of strong currents (such as Gulf Stream or a downstream river).

## **2. The World's Longest Swim by Distance in the Mediterranean Sea: 191.17 km**

Previous record was :

- 142.3 km by Neil Agius (Malta), swum around the Maltese Islands (Mellieha Bay to Ghar Lapsi) in the Mediterranean Sea, on 21–23 September 2024, in a swimsuit — ratified by WOWSA. Noam Yaron's 191.17 km surpasses this performance by 48.87 km.

Noam Yaron's 191.17 km establishes the longest distance ever swum in the Mediterranean Sea.

## **3. The World's Longest Swim by Distance in a Wetsuit in the Mediterranean Sea: 191.17 km**

No prior record existed in this category. The most comparable documented performance is:

- 142.3 km by Neil Agius (Malta), swum around the Maltese Islands (Mellieha Bay to Ghar Lapsi) in the Mediterranean Sea, on 21–23 September 2024 — ratified by WOWSA. Completed in a swimsuit, not a wetsuit, and therefore does not constitute a record in this category.

Noam Yaron's 191.17 km in the Mediterranean Sea is the first-ever world record in this category.

#### **4. The World's Longest Continuous Swim by Duration: 102 hours and 24 minutes**

Noam Yaron's 102 hours 24 minutes surpasses all previously documented continuous swims, including:

- 76 hours 30 minutes by Nejib Belhedi (Tunisia), swum from Sfax (Thyna) to Djerba Island across the Gulf of Gabès, Mediterranean Sea, on 15–18 September 2018 — recognized by Guinness World Records in 2019 as the Longest Duration Ocean Swim (marathon swimming); independently under review by WOWSA since 2023.
- 67 hours 16 minutes by Sarah Thomas (USA), swum from Rouses Point, New York, looping around Gardiner Island, Vermont, and returning to Rouses Point in Lake Champlain, on 7–10 August 2017 — ratified by the Marathon Swimmers Federation (MSF) and recognized by Guinness World Records as the Longest Continuous Swim in a Lake.
- 60 hours 35 minutes by Neil Agius (Malta), swum around the Maltese Islands (Mellieha Bay to Ghar Lapsi) in the Mediterranean Sea, on 21–23 September 2024 — ratified by WOWSA as the Longest Unassisted, Current-Neutral Ocean Swim.
- 54 hours 45 minutes by Ross Edgley (United Kingdom), swum from Lower Laberge to the Stewart River confluence in the Yukon River, Canada, on 16–18 June 2024 — recognized by Guinness World Records as the Longest Distance Assisted Adventure Swim (current-assisted river swim, wetsuit).

Noam Yaron's 102 hours 24 minutes surpasses all performances and establishes the longest continuous swim ever recorded by duration.

#### **5. The World's Longest Continuous Swim by Duration in a Wetsuit: 102 hours and 24 minutes**

Noam Yaron's 102 hours 24 minutes surpasses all previously documented continuous swims in this category, including:

- 54 hours 45 minutes by Ross Edgley (United Kingdom), swum from Lower Laberge to the Stewart River confluence in the Yukon River, Canada, on 16–18 June 2024 — recognized by Guinness World Records as the Longest Distance Assisted Adventure Swim (wetsuit, current-assisted river). Completed in a strong current-assisted river, not in open ocean, and therefore does not constitute a record in this category.

Noam Yaron's 102 hours 24 minutes is the longest continuous swim in a wetsuit ever recorded.

## **6. The World's Longest Swim by Duration in the Mediterranean Sea: 102 hours and 24 minutes**

Noam Yaron's 102 hours 24 minutes surpasses all previously documented continuous swims in this category, including:

- 76 hours 30 minutes by Nejb Belhedi (Tunisia), swum from Sfax (Thyna) to Djerba Island across the Gulf of Gabès, Mediterranean Sea, on 15–18 September 2018 — recognized by Guinness World Records in 2019; independently under review by WOWSA since 2023.

- 76 hours 30 minutes by Nejb Belhedi (Tunisia), swum from Sfax (Thyna) to Djerba Island across the Gulf of Gabès, Mediterranean Sea, on 15–18 September 2018 — recognized by Guinness World Records in 2019; independently under review by WOWSA since 2023. Completed in a swimsuit, not a wetsuit, and therefore does not constitute a record in this category.
- 60 hours 35 minutes by Neil Agius (Malta), swum around the Maltese Islands (Mellieha Bay to Ghar Lapsi) in the Mediterranean Sea, on 21–23 September 2024 — ratified by WOWSA. Completed in a swimsuit, not a wetsuit, and therefore does not constitute a record in this category.

Noam Yaron's 102 hours 24 minutes establishes the first-ever world record in this category.

## **8. The World's Longest Ocean Swim by Duration in a Wetsuit: 102 hours and 24 minutes**

No prior record existed in this category. The most comparable documented performance is:

- 54 hours 45 minutes by Ross Edgley (United Kingdom), swum from Lower Laberge to the Stewart River confluence in the Yukon River, Canada, on 16–18 June 2024 — recognized by Guinness World Records as the Longest Distance Assisted Adventure Swim (wetsuit, current-assisted river). Completed in a strong current-assisted river, not in open ocean, and therefore does not constitute a record in this category.

Noam Yaron's 102 hours 24 minutes in the Mediterranean Sea establishes the first-ever world record in this category.

## SUMMARY

On 11 August 2025 at 7:51 am, Noam Yaron swam from Corsica, France to the nearshore waters of Monaco across the Mediterranean Sea. He was involuntarily pulled from the water at 2:15 pm on 15 August 2025 within 2 km of the shore of Monaco.

Yaron swam for 102 hours 24 minutes (over the course of 4 days 6 hours 24 minutes), completing a total swimming distance of 191,17 km.

## Swimmer

Yaron is a 29-year-old Swiss adventurer who has competed in numerous open water swimming competitions and solo swims including

- 75 km crossing of Lake Geneva in 19 hours 53 minutes in 2021
- Odyssée des Lacs stage swim across the 5 largest lakes in Switzerland in a cumulative time of 60 hours 40 minutes covering 188 km over 11 days in 2022
- attempted the first 171 km Odyssée Méditerranée from Corsica to Monaco that was aborted due to rough, unsafe conditions on 23 August 2024 after 103 km and 48 hours spent in the Mediterranean Sea.

## Rules

The longest non-stop continuous swim in a wetsuit without leaving the water. Yaron aims to traverse from Corsica to Monaco, using the freestyle swim stroke, from shore to shore with use of the following equipment. He will stop occasionally to drink, eat, stretch, and rest for short periods, but he will not get on his escort boats or use any equipment that will propel him forward. He may switch to breaststroke and backstroke on occasion. His goal is to walk in, swim across, and walk out.

## Equipment

During the swim, Yaron used the following equipment:

- wore a full-body wetsuit for the entire distance
- used FORM swim goggles for the entire distance
- used a swim cap for the entire distance
- Sharkbanz to deter sharks
- occasionally wore gloves and booties and hoodies when jellyfish swarms were encountered
- occasionally used Shokz MP3 waterproof audio device
- occasionally used an anti-jellyfish net at the front of his primary escort boat to protect from jellyfish and to collect plastics
- swam behind his primary escort boat with one long navigation line that doubled up so it appears that he was swimming between two long navigation lane lines
- swam either beside or over an underwater swim streamer that occasionally rose to the surface and was lit in low-light or night hours
- single use of an emergency blanket
- use of a sun hat before exiting the water

## Feat & Testimonials from Observers

His observers were all present on two different escort boats in close proximity to Yaron throughout his swim from start to finish.

While all the members of the entire Observer Team were not all awake throughout the entire swim, several of them were awake and observing Yaron at all times throughout the swim.

The Observer Team confirmed the following:

- Yaron completed the world's longest non-stop continuous sea swim by duration and distance: 4 days 6 hours 24 minutes (102h24min) and 191.17km in the Mediterranean Sea without assistance or artificial propulsion.
- Yaron started at 7:51 am on 11 August and finished at 2:15 pm on 15 August 2025 when he was pulled from the water on orders of the doctors and the team due to serious concerns for his health.
- Yaron never got out of the water for any reason.
- Yaron never touched his two escort boats.
- Yaron was never touched by any support crew members.
- Yaron was never pulled forward in any way by a rope or other assistance.

## Post-Swim

Immediately after his swim, Yaron was taken to the Centre Hospitalier Princesse Grace Hospital in Monaco where he was hospitalized for 8 days and then transferred for 1 day at the CHUV Hospital in Lausanne, Switzerland to recover from the unprecedented feat of endurance and severe injuries, including the following:

- deep second-degree burns affecting 15% of his body
- oxygen saturation dropped to 77% due to pulmonary edema
- approximately 95% of his lungs filled with fluid

## Comparative Swims

While all the following individuals achieved awe-inspiring Guinness World Record open water swims, Yaron spent the greatest amount of hours swimming continuously than anyone else in history: 4 days 6 hours 24 minutes – or 102 hours and 24 minutes.

- Charles Jimmy Zibelman of the USA swam 233 km in 148 hours down the Hudson River in New York from Albany to Manhattan in August 1937. He reportedly slept on occasion. See WOWSA article [here](#) and Marathon Swimmers Federation records [here](#).
- Martin Strel of Slovenia swam 504.5 km in 84 hours downstream in the Danube river from Austria to Hungary in July 2001. See Guinness World Record [here](#).
- Ricardo Hoffman of Argentina swam 481 km down the Paraná River in Argentina from Corriente to Santa Elena in 84 hours 37 minutes between 3-6 March 1981. See Guinness World Record notation [here](#) and Marathon Swimmers Federation records [here](#).
- Sarah Thomas of the USA swam 168.3 km across Lake Champlain in New York in 67 hours 16 minutes between 7-10 August 2017. See Guinness World Record [here](#) and Marathon Swimmers Federation records [here](#).

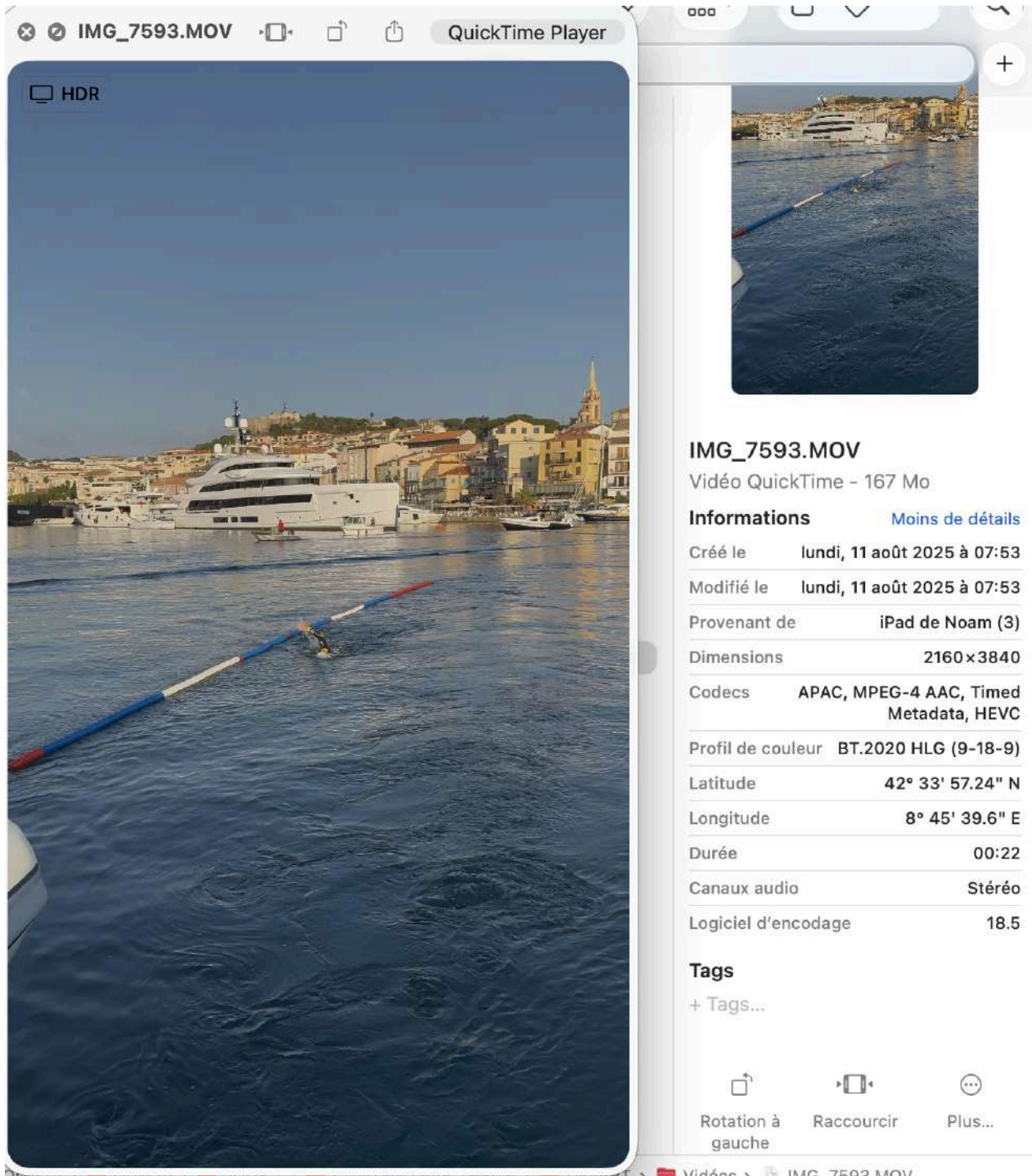


## Swim Finish (video)


